Workshop Description

Research on social inequalities has been on the rise in the past decade, demonstrating the persistence and widening of inequality at the global scale. It has also been increasingly interdisciplinary – spanning a variety of fields, from sociology to health and environmental studies – as well as intersectional. While classical approaches have focused on income or education, current research explores how factors such as gender, race, ethnicity, or geographical location contribute to shaping the unequal distribution of resources and opportunities. In this context, the COVID-19 pandemic has operated both as a revelator and an intensifier of social inequalities, and has heightened hierarchies of exposure to the virus as well as of access to care.

This workshop is organized around the visit to Abu Dhabi by members of the research unit "The Production and Reproduction of Social Inequalities" at the University of Cologne, which addresses the overarching question of why attempts aimed at increasing equality often have contributed to generating more durable inequalities. The purpose of this workshop is to initiate a dialogue between the members of this research unit and NYUAD faculty members and students working on inequality.

Conversations will take place over two days, with the first day focused on the conceptual frameworks and methodologies of researching inequality; and a second day dedicated to looking at inequality through a specific focus, first on a phenomenon (the global COVID-19 pandemic); and second, on a regional area: the Gulf and Arabian Peninsula.
